A message from the Regional Landcare Coordinator

Hi everyone,

I have been so pleased to be involved in local Landcare events over the past month. In partnership with Barkers Creek Landcare and Wildlife Group, Connecting Country and Agriculture Victoria, we hosted a 'Rabbit Buster' event on Sunday 16 February. The landholders kindly allowed more than 55 people onto their property. We spent the morning hearing from the Ag Vic Biosecurity Team, followed by contractor Jarrod Coote demonstrating rabbit management techniques and sharing 20 years of his practical experience managing rabbits.

The Landcare group has had success using specially designed <u>bait stations</u> as part of their integrated control program. Each participant in attendance at the event was gifted a bait station. The next six weeks is a critical period to undertake rabbit control as a community, so we look forward to the impact in the local area.

Campaspe Shire and Mount Alexander region Landcare support staff have been busy organising their gettogethers with member groups showcasing the diversity Landcare activities. I am biased but Connecting Country's Landcare link-up was a highlight for me this month, as it featured some of the amazing Intrepid Landcare crew. The crew remains connected through social media and since our retreat in August 2019, have immersed themselves in climate change leadership, weed control and environmental education programs.

At a regional scale, North Central CMA has begun consultation around the Regional Catchment Strategy renewal through our Regional Roundtable events. We're asking you to book your seat at the table and tell us what you value and where we should focus our efforts on land, water and biodiversity management. See page 12 for the event details.

At a state scale, the Victorian Landcare Team met for two days on February 20 & 21 to discuss the future of the Victorian Landcare Program (VLP), which includes

Loddon Plains Landcare Network extends its activities across oceans

Loddon Plains Landcare Network's Landcare Facilitator, Danny Pettingill has been a key driver of a program to take beekeeping and land management skills to Samoa.

This program, a version having been delivered in 2018, will once again be developed as a series of training and education workshops to be rolled out in Samoa in April 2020.

The program, funded by a consortium of the Crawford Fund, Loddon Plains Landcare Network and Bendigo Rotary will enable Danny and another beekeeper from the north central region of Victoria to travel to Samoa. The program has been designed to provide and share skills in beekeeping to help with the establishment and development of small-scale apiaries in village communities, particularly for women in Samoa.

The program, in context of a mixed enterprise business model with apiary as a focus, will deliver key workshops in small to large-scale beekeeping and cover project design, creating sustainable small-scale agriculture operations, environment and NRM training, understanding the value and conservation of local pollinating species such as invertebrates, birds etc. and promoting the value in conservation and biosecurity.

An exchange will take place in 2020 in which selected leaders within the group of Samoan participants will have an opportunity to come to Australia in September 2020. These participants will spend time with the Loddon Plains Landcare Network, Bendigo Rotary and Apiarists in the North Central area with the assistance of the VAA Bendigo branch. The visit will form a crucial opportunity to understand and experience local small-scale agriculture and food production, and extend their skills in flora, land management, agriculture principles and apiary skills before taking this knowledge back to Samoa.

The program will also cover flora identification and understanding pollen and nectar sources and the importance of pollination to small to medium agriculture and food production and how these elements dove tail into a small mixed farming operation.

Successful delivery of this program will provide participants with a sound understanding of the operations and planning involved in small to medium scale apiary operations and provide participants with confidence to undertake or develop their own operations.

The program will aim to reinforce learning and training with a follow up visit of Australian trainers in early 2021.

Victorian Landcare Team update

The Victorian Landcare Team made up of 10 Regional Landcare Coordinators and DELWP's Victorian Landcare Program staff met for two days on February 19 and 20.

The meeting focused on the future of the Victorian Landcare Program, the achievements of the 2018-19 program year andupdating the team's workplan. The two days also enabled the team to discuss funding to train and support Landcare Facilitators, environmental volunteers and to create stronger partnerships between Landcare and Traditional Owners.

The productive sessions created a clear focus and set goals for our collective team working toward June 30 while ensuring the voice of grassroots Landcare was heard by the Victorian Landcare Program team.

Nardoo Hills 'Climate-Ready' Revegetation project

Guidance for Bush Heritage Australia (BHA) The

project will provide direction to BHA on future revegetation options at Nardoo and a model for similar revegetation projects (in the face of climate change) elsewhere in Australia. The project will create opportunities for scientists, researchers and enterprises to participate and/or i track the outcomes from this major research trial.

Traditional revegetation programs use locally sourced seed based on the expectation they are the most suited

to the local environment. This approach is now considered high risk due to the changing climate (Breed et al., 2013). Bush Heritage seeks to build climate adaptation options for its reserves.

Holistic Management Community of Practice

A group of holistic management farmers that I support as a community of practice recently got together at Sam White's property 'Sidonia Beef Naturally' located at Sidonia.

The group invited farmers who have just completed an eight-day holistic management course based at Kyneton to Sam's property. These farmers are new to holistic management and are on a steep learning curve to implement the new practices and management systems learnt during the course. This is where a mentor group is valuable in assisting farmers to transition from their previous practices and management systems to newly learnt ones.

To start the day Sam provided an overview of his farming operation, which produces beef cattle. Sam's number one goal is maintaining 100 per cent ground cover 100% of the time - a big factor in being resilient to climate change and also providing protection to the soil from wind and water erosion. To achieve this goal Sam made the decision to sell most of his cattle last year, he is currently rebuilding his herd and has 250 head of cattle. It was a difficult decision, but with the continued dry

conditions last year he was very happy with how quickly his pasture responded when it did rain. He also has 100 head of cattle on agistment from drought and fire affected NSW.

The group toured Sam's property looking at a 120-day recovery paddock, with many questions and discussions throughout the day including how well the perennials grasses were doing, the amount of cover protecting the soil and the number of new germinating pasture plants. During these discussions many of the holistic management farmers commented on the resilience of their farms and how well their properties looked during these dry times.

This group of farmers are passionate about their farming and how they manage their soil and are excited to be able to share their knowledge and skills with other farmers. The group continues to provide support and are arranging other opportunities for the groups to meet and share their experiences and learning.

This multi-regional approach makes for consistent messaging across the state and it is a great way to foster collaboration of ideas between agencies and provides a broad network of support for all involved.



Landmate update

The daily cost of Landmate crews is increasing in 2020.

Matthew Menhennet, coordinator of the Landmate Environment Program provided the following update for Landcare.

Over recent years Landmate has provided increased support for environmental on ground works across the state. In the 2018/19 financial year Landmate delivered:

- 1,234 crew days of labour
- planting 49,739 trees
- erecting 72 Kilometres of fencing
- and many hectares of woody weeds clearing

"I would like to thank you for supporting Landmate work over the years, as the direct benefit to prisoners in giving back to the community is hugely important for them at a time when they may soon be released.

"For many prisoners, who possibly made one bad choice in life, being able to interact with the community by working on projects such as yours, is a real positive step forward physically, socially and mentally," said Matthew.

The Department of Justice and Community Safety is committed to a long term vision of Landmate and to ensure the strength of the program continues, will be increasing the daily cost of a Landmate crew from \$400 plus GST to \$450 plus GST from 1 July 2020. Note that this cost will only apply to the Landmate partnership projects that are not funded by the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning's grant programs.

This is the first change to the cost of Landmate since ~2014 and will contribute directly to the long-term strength of the program.

"After extensive discussions with current customers and stakeholders, I have been impressed by the feedback about the value Landmate is seen to provide and we hope to continue to support project owners and community groups in completing projects and achieve positive environmental outcomes."
