

# A message from the Regional Waterwatch Coordinator

Hello everyone,

Welcome to the August edition of the North Central Chat, most of you will know me as Cass from the Waterwatch program. I will be bringing you the Chat news over the next few months as we reach for our winter woolly warmers - yes, it's still freezing cold, with Bendigo having one of its coldest days in July this year in more than 22 years.

Last week was busy for Waterwatch and Landcare as we celebrated 25 years of Waterwatch with our community volunteers and received wonderful news about the Victorian Landcare Grants.

The Victorian Government recently released the 2018-19 Victorian Landcare Grants; with 143 project grants, 218 support grants and two start-up grants funded across the state.

12 project grants were successful in the North Central CMA region, attracting \$134,750 in funding. Projects included:

- Barkers Creek wetland educating through restoration (Harcourt Valley Landcare
- Championing Bendigo Creek in a time of change (Northern Bendigo Landcare Group).
- Driving change on Cornish Hill (Friends of Cornish Hill).
- Restoring Malmsbury biodiversity with a common community approach (Malmsbury District Landcare Group).
- Across the North Central CMA region, 43 groups were also successful in receiving support grants.

# Celebrating 25 years of Waterwatch event

Over the centuries, amateur scientists and volunteers made key contributions to the understanding of climate, evolution, geological processes, electricity, astronomy, and other phenomena. Before the internet and mobile devices, many naturalists, including Charles Darwin, contributed observations to museums and universities for researchers to study, we call this citizen science (Auerbach 2015).

Today, citizen science plays a major role almost in natural resource management, from monitoring birds in our backyards to squirrel gliders on the Campaspe River, native vegetation and monitoring the health of waterways.

North Central Waterwatch is one of Australia's longest running citizen science programs. Our dedicated team of Waterwatch volunteers are gathering information, sharing knowledge, and contributing to decisions about the future of our waterways and we wanted to say thank you.



On Tuesday 24 July, the Waterwatch team gathered at Star Cinema in Eaglehawk to celebrate 25 years of Waterwatch and the amazing contribution our volunteers make to monitoring the health of our region's waterways.

Brad Drust, North Central CMA CEO, awarded certificates to volunteers who had reached milestones for their years of contribution including, Ruth Penny for 20 years (who unfortunately couldn't attend), Mel and Aaron Watts and Geoff McLeod for 15 years and 11 volunteers received certificates for 10 years including Marion de Costa who is now hanging up her 'meter'.

The 20 years of Waterwatch report was launched at the 25 years of Waterwatch events by Senior Aquatic Pollution Ecologist, David Tiller. He shared the story of Waterwatch and how citizen science plays an important role in understanding our catchment, we wouldn't know what we know without our communities getting involved.

David said Waterwatch will provide a lasting legacy of understanding in our regions as we move towards strengthening the programs involvement in monitoring the ecological condition of our waterways.



#### Aboriginal Water Program

The Aboriginal Water Program aims to further include Aboriginal people in the way water is managed across Victoria and to reconnect communities to water for cultural, economic, customary and spiritual purposes.

On 22 June 2018, the Victorian Government announced the recipients of this year's Aboriginal Water Grants.

Eight projects were funded with three Traditional Owner groups across the North Central CMA region receiving funding:

- Taungurung restoring water restoring country, Taungurung -Restoring Water, Restoring Country
- Djandak (Dja Dja Wurrung) Kapa Gatjin (To Know Water)
- North Central CMA Barapa Barapa,
  Wemba Wemba Water for country

## New research: Victoria's inland wetlands store \$6 billion in carbon stocks

Victoria's inland wetlands lock away the annual emissions of 185,000 people, or roughly the population of Geelong, according to the state's first ever tally of the valuable environmental resources. # Water Storage - May update

So far it's been a long, cold and dry winter with not much rain fall across the catchment. According to

the Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) the August outlook shows most of Victoria, NSW and Queensland are likely to be drier than average. Water storage levels across the catchment seem to average around 80 -90% in the Murray storages while the Loddon storages on average are around 60%.
