Victorian Junior Landcare and Biodiversity Grants

On 3 September 2018, the Victorian Government announced \$413,115 of funding to 109 eligible projects for the 2018 Victorian Junior Landcare and Biodiversity Grants - delivered in partnership with Landcare Australia.

Congratulations to the seven schools and preschools in the North Central CMA region who received Junior Landcare and Biodiversity Grants.

The grants, of up to \$5,000 each (excl GST) will support Victorian primary and secondary schools, kindergartens, preschools, childcare centres, scouts and guides and other youth groups, including specialist schools and groups working with culturally and linguistically diverse communities.

Successful projects are supporting the younger generation to protect biodiversity through onground action, to help improve and restore habitat for Victoria's native plants and animals, and also through educational activities that involve and



engage young people in valuing and actively caring for Victoria's natural environment.

Need proof that keeping stock out of our waterways is good for the environment?

Darren White, North Central CMAs Environmental Flows Project Manager tells us why.

As part of the Victorian Environmental Flows Monitoring and Assessment Program (VEFMAP) a number of grazing exclosures on the Campaspe River have been installed. This was done to ensure there was no gazing from stock, macropods, rabbits, etc. on the vegetation and to provide opportunity for germination of native species as a result of inundation.

This site has been fenced off for more than 12 months and only receives periodic grazing, there has been a marked response.



The aim of this project is to deliver a high flow that will inundate the exclosure, drowning out the terrestrial (non-native) grasses in readiness for another spring growing season.

Currently the Lake Eppalock outlet is going full noise to deliver our spring high flow in the Campaspe River.

The exclosure plot (image below) is now under the influence of this spring high flow. As you can see the flow is designed to inundate to the entire plot to the top of the fenced area.



The water will be held at this level for six days to drown out the terrestrial weeds and promote germination of native species that should reside in this section of the river bank. As the weather warms up, VEFMAP ecologists will resurvey the site to document the impact of this flow.

National Waterbug Blitz events

In spring each year, Australians are encouraged to become citizen scientists and investigate how healthy their local waterways and wetlands are by exploring and identifying what waterbugs they contain.

The first ever National Waterbug Blitz will have scientists and citizen scientists working together to look at river health on a local and national scale.

After each National Waterbug Blitz an interpretive annual report and map of river health across the nation is created by freshwater ecologists. The report helps catchment managers better maintain or improve the condition of waterways.

Why get involved?

- Learn about freshwater ecosystems and waterbugs
- Get outdoors and spend time in nature discovering and exploring our waterways
- Find out if the waterways you care about are healthy
- Contribute to data sets that can help us improve the condition of our rivers and wetlands.

Join North Central Waterwatch and John Gooderham, freshwater ecologist and co-author of The Waterbug Book, to learn all about freshwater creatures! Already know a bit about waterbugs? Come along and refresh your macroinvertebrate identification skills, and possibly see some new taxa.

The training day is suited to all citizen science participants, Waterwatch Coordinators and agency partners. No previous experience in sampling and identification is required. The training will use Agreed Level Taxonomy (ALT) macroinvertebrate methods as the standard approach that is used by Waterwatch volunteers across Victoria.

On-farm energy grants



You can now apply for an on-farm energy grant at agriculture.vic.gov.au/agenergy

The grants provide support to farmers to replace energy inefficient equipment, install more energy efficient systems and enable own-generation capacity.

Farmers are encouraged to apply early as grants are available to eligible primary producers until March 2020 or until available funding is exhausted (whichever comes first).

Any farmer wanting to access one of the grants needs to have had an approved on-farm energy assessment.

Recreational Fishing Grants Program

Every year the Victorian Government, through the Recreational Fishing Licence Trust Account, disburses revenue derived from the sale of Recreational Fishing Licences to projects that will improve recreational fishing in Victoria.

Since its inception in 2001, the Recreational Fishing Grants Program (RFGP) has funded over 600 projects, worth more than \$21 million throughout Victoria. The RFGP comprises three separate programs including:

- A Small Grants Program that is continually open to fund small projects (up to \$5,000 -GST Exclusive)
- A Large Grants Program (for projects from \$5,001 to \$100,000 GST Exclusive)
- A Commissioning Program for large priority projects (generally in excess of \$100,000).

2019 Science and Innovation Awards



Grant applications are now open for the 2019 Science and Innovation Awards for Young People in Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry. If you're 18-35, this is your chance to apply for a grant of up to \$22,000 to fund your project on an innovative or emerging scientific issue that will benefit Australia's primary industries.

The Hon. David Littleproud MP, Minister for Agriculture and Water Resources, launched the 2019 Awards.

The Science Awards encourage young scientists, researchers, innovators and others active in the agriculture sector who have an original project that will contribute to the ongoing success and sustainability of Australia's agricultural, fisheries and forestry industries. The Science Awards have already helped more than 230 young Australians make their ideas a reality and showcase their talent to the world.

There are thirteen industry Science Award categories open for applications: cotton, dairy, eggs and poultry (layers), established, new and emerging rural industries, fisheries and aquaculture, forest and wood products, grains, health and biosecurity, meat and livestock, pork, red meat processing, viticulture and oenology, and wool. Each category includes a \$22,000 grant and is generously supported by the research and development corporations and industry organisations as our Science Award partners.
