As we continue to celebrate 25 Years of Landcare with many planned events and activities, there has been a timely announcement by the State Government regarding funding to celebrate this milestone. The Victorian Government has made available \$600,000 for the 25th Anniversary of Landcare Grants – Looking Back Looking Forward.

The grants will enable Landcare groups and networks across the state to mark this milestone and to look forward to the next 25 years alongside future generations of Landcarers. All ten Victorian Catchment Management Authority's (CMAs) have been allocated a total of \$60,000 for Landcare groups to undertake small projects. Grants will be awarded on a competitive basis where proposals meet the objectives stated in the guidelines. Applicants should focus on addressing local priorities and activities that improve land, water and biodiversity and demonstrate links to the community. The guidelines and application forms will be sent out in the next couple of weeks so stay tuned and near your group's mail box!

In order to get a picture of 25 Years of Landcare we will be working with groups to collect photographs taken over the past 25 years. These photos will be displayed at an event celebrating this special milestone,

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which will be held later on in the year. So get your photo albums out and dust off those old slides; it will be great to get as many photos from as many different groups as we can! If you have photos in an electronic form please email them to either Ashley or myself, or alternatively scan/photocopy a hardcopy and post them to us!

A quick update about where the 2011-12 Victorian Landcare Grants are at: All of the applications have been assessed and we are now in the process of contacting groups that need to make alterations to their application. Once this process has been completed and the grant allocations endorsed by the Standing Grants Panel all groups will be notified by mail and agreement forms will be posted.

For groups that have outstanding Second Generation Landcare Grant Final Reports please ensure that they are completed and returned as soon as possible. We are currently chasing these, as we are required to finalise the program with the Department of Sustainability and Environment (DSE). To avoid the pending phone call - please get your reports in!

We are approaching a very exciting time in Landcare's 25 year history. I look forward to celebrating the achievements of our volunteers who devote themselves tirelessly for the benefit of the environment around us. National Tree Day event

A glorious day greeted more than 100 volunteers at the Goldleaf Wetland at Huntly for a National Tree Day event co-hosted by the City of Greater Bendigo (CoGB) and the Northern Bendigo Landcare Group on Sunday 31 July.

Volunteers planted almost 5,000 trees and shrubs at the wetland to revegetate the area, provide enhanced shelter for wildlife and improve biodiversity values. People from all over Bendigo, many of which were young families, enjoyed the sunny conditions. Organisers were very pleased to see so many children actively involved in tree planting and having a lot of fun.

On the day the local Lions Club provided a free BBQ; a mud sculpting children's activity was offered by the Children's Art Network; the Landcare Group presented a display of their projects and future plans; and the CoGB handed out free indigenous plant guides.

This little-known wetland area is managed by the CoGB and we are sure the event helped to lift its profile as a valuable recreational area.

Woodland birds put on a wonderful display

Connecting Country's monitoring focus recently shifted from nest boxes to woodland birds; as the winter bird community puts on a wonderful display of recovery following favourable environmental conditions. This focus allows the use of woodland bird diversity and numbers as an indicator of landscape change, especially as a result of beneficial land management strategies that have been funded and facilitated by Connecting Country.

A total of 50 bird survey sites have been selected across the Mt Alexander Shire region through consultation with landholders, members of the management committee and other environmental agencies/stakeholders. To generate a meaningful dataset that will tell the story of landscape change over time, site categories were developed, such as; reference sites (intact vegetation and geomorphology); restoration sites (where land rehabilitation will occur/has occurred); and sites of conventional use (under grazing &/or cropping regimes). All sites were to receive an 'am' and 'pm' survey to ensure a comprehensive snapshot was achieved for each location/site condition.

Flora and fauna consultants Garry and Brenda Cheers were engaged to perform the bird surveys within a timeframe that suited the sampling plan, and developed in partnership with Deakin University. Recently I had the pleasure of discussing with Garry some of the exciting aspects of observations made during the survey work undertaken. After completing more than 70 surveys Garry reported the following notable observations; large groups of Striated Pardalote's around the Yandoit area; Speckled Warblers observed in the Maldon Historic Reserve (Nuggetty aspect); a significant increase in the numbers and range of Flame Robins and Superb Fairy-wrens; and an early appearance of spring migrants such as the Fan-tailed Cuckoo and Rufous Songlarks.

In general, it appears that the numbers and diversity of small foraging birds are on the increase, and that the appearance this season of certain species in these numbers may be quite unique to the landscape. This presents a wonderful opportunity for community groups and individuals alike to get out there and make some of their own observations, and enjoy the festivity of calls and colours of our regions flourishing birdlife. A diamond in the rough

Whilst undertaking a flood assessment on a property on Mt Cameron road near Clunes, North Central Catchment Management Authority (CMA) Catchment Restoration Officer Nick Layne, stumbled across some Growling Grass frogs (*Litoria raniformis*). It was on a plateau above the incised basalt valley where five frogs were found under a sheet of tin at the local Gun Club.

In the spring and summer times the landholder has reported that there are plenty of Growling Grass frogs sitting amongst the Cumbungi in the pond at his house. At a state level, the Growling Grass frog is classified as a threatened species under the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988, and listed as vulnerable in the 1997 *Action Plan for Australian Frogs*. However, according to the landholder, the frogs are 'exceptionally common in the area' - so if you happen to be passing through and hear some frogs calling, there is a good chance that they might just be Growling Grass frogs.

How much fire is enough?

For the second talk of the Education Program 2011 the Connecting Country project is hosting a free information night on Thursday 25 August at Campbell's Creek Community Centre. The management of Box-Ironbark forests through controlled fire will be the topic of conversation.

Fire can be used to reduce fuel hazard, and it can also be used to promote biodiversity. But what is the 'natural' fire regime in Box-Ironbark forests? How much fire can Box-Ironbark forests tolerate and how much burning should or could we be doing there?

Connecting Country project manager Chris Timewell said the night will be an opportunity for the community to hear and discuss the management of Box-Ironbark forests using fire.

Guest speaker, Dr Arn Tolsma, a senior scientist in Community Ecology at the Arthur Rylah Institute, has a particular knowledge of forests and woodlands in our region. In 2007 Dr Tolsma co-authored a research paper for the North Central CMA on fire ecology and management.

"One of the main problems that natural resource managers face is balancing the needs or wishes for a controlled fire regime with the needs of our native plants and animals," Dr Tolsma said this week. "If management burns are too frequent, there is a risk of long term decline in some native species, and deterioration of soil quality. On the other hand, there is also the risk of losing species if burns are not frequent enough."

He concluded that, "We are starting to get a better understanding of the way Aborigines used fire in this region. Most Box-Ironbark species do not need fire to regenerate, but we still need to do more research into how much fire is appropriate."

So how much fire is enough? To find out, turn up to the Campbell's Creek Community Centre on Thursday 25 August. A light supper will be served from 6.30pm, and the talk will go from 7 to 9pm. Bookings can be made by contacting Chris on 03 5472 1594 or chris@connectingcountry.org.au.

This free event is part of Connecting Country's Yellow Box Woodland project. The project is being undertaken in partnership with the North Central CMA and is co-funded by the federal Caring for our Country program and the State Natural Resource Investment Program.





Climate Change Discussion-Woodend

Professor David Karoly, climate scientist and member of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, will be speaking at an event in Woodend on Wednesday 31 August at 7.30pm. Prof Karoly is an expert in climate change science and was involved, through several different roles, in the preparation of the Fourth Assessment Report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) released in 2007. He is actively involved in research on climate variability and climate change; was Chair of the Premier of Victoria's Climate Change Reference Group during 2008-09; and has been a strong supporter of grass roots movements.

Bendigo Creek Community Field Day

Thanks to a Second Generation Landcare Grant the Northern Bendigo Landcare Group launched their long-term commitment to the restoration of the Bendigo Creek between Huntly and Epsom in 2010/11. To celebrate Landcare Week and the value of this often misunderstood waterway, everyone is invited to a field day on Sunday 11 September. The field day starts at 9.30am from Leans Road Huntly. Participants will enjoy a day of talks, walks and hands-on activities designed to raise awareness of the Bendigo Creek and contribute to restoration works.

Short talks will discuss the assets, threats and importance of the Bendigo Creek in the past, present and future; the indigenous heritage, gold rush days, features of healthy riverine environments and the role of a creek that flows from a growing urban centre. Active sessions will include treeplanting, macro-invertebrate sampling and a walk to view and discuss the function of nestboxes. The afternoon will involve a bus tour visiting two significant sites downstream including Terrick Terrick National Park where Parks Victoria and the Northern Plains CMN manage native grasslands, maintain biolinks between the park and the Bendigo Creek, and monitor Plains Wanderer populations. The tour will end where Bendigo Creek does - at the nationally important wetland known as Kow Swamp. It will end with enjoyable talks about the area, its importance for native birds and its role within the catchment.
