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A message from the Regional Landcare Coordinator

Hi everyone,

It has been a very busy couple of weeks in the office with the end of (and new) financial year and of course Second Generation Landcare Grants (SGLG)! This year we were significantly oversubscribed for the 2010-11 SGLG program. The total value of applications received was \$841,382. The North Central Catchment Management Authority (CMA) was allocated \$300,000 by the State Government for the devolved grants program. It is great to see that there are so many Landcare groups throughout the region keen to do activities in their patch. Although not everyone will get funding, the sheer volume of applications means that we can highlight to the government the importance of the SGLG program and supporting community groups to achieve onground landscape changes – well done!

We received 34 Major Integrated Project applications, 30 Small Grant applications and 52 Group Maintenance Grant applications. It was extremely positive to see such a diverse range of interesting and innovative projects being proposed across the region. The quality of the applications was extremely high, which made the task of the Standing Grants Committee very challenging. All groups will be notified over the coming week regarding the outcomes.

Due to the program being substantially oversubscribed, there will be groups that unfortunately miss out on Second Generation Landcare funding. There are still funding opportunities available with other organisations and through Federal Government programs. In the **Funding News** section of *Groundcover* this month we have included a number of grants that are available and also provided some websites and resources that might be useful. So don't just shelve this year's SGLG application, you can use it to put together future funding applications.

Two funding programs that you may consider include the Caring for our Country community action grants which close on 31 August. Or if your group is trying to tackle Gorse you might consider the Victorian Gorse Taskforce community support grants which close on 20 August. For more information on these and other funding opportunities make sure you read **Funding News**.

The Landcare team at North Central CMA is growing

The Federal Government's Caring for our Country (CfoC) program recently announced that the North Central region has been successful in their funding application for a full time Landcare Facilitator for the next three years. The facilitator will work with groups in the North Central Region to promote sustainable farm and land management practices and conservation, as these aims align with CfoC targets. The facilitator will also help Landcare groups and Networks to access funding, partnerships, training and information.

This position will be filled within the next few months, and will be another vital resource for Landcare groups and networks to utilise in the region

Local Action Planning

Does your Landcare group or network have a vision for action in your area? The Landcare support team from the North Central CMA will be available to assist groups by using maps of their local area to identify key assets and threats to develop an action plan for future works and projects. Local Action Plans can then form the basis of funding applications to allow you to take advantage of opportunities as they arise, rather than the last minute rush to pull bids together. The report is in on Victorian Landcare

The 2008-2009 Victorian Landcare Program Report Card is now available online. The report has been compiled to give the Landcare community a chance to reflect on their successes and build an understanding of the accomplishments of Landcare groups and networks throughout the state.

The first ever Second Generation Landcare Grants report card has also just been released online. The report outlines works completed throughout the state in 2008 as part of the Second Generation Landcare Grants program where 340 groups were supported to run 262 projects to improve the health of Victoria's land, biodiversity and waterways.



Wonderful wildflowers

The Castlemaine Field Naturalists club has recently launched a new brochure titled Indigenous Plants of Castlemaine and Surrounds. The guide uses photography from local field naturalists and other observers to provide over 80 colourful pictures of indigenous plants in flower. The work was supported by the Norman Wettenhall Foundation, the North Central CMA, the Department of Sustainability and Environment (DSE), Mount Alexander Shire, Connecting Country, and Friends of Box-Ironbark Forests. The brochure is available from the Information Centre in Mostyn Street, Castlemaine and the Castlemaine Library.

The latest on locusts

Locusts are unfortunately going to impact many farmers in our region this year with what has been described as one of the worst locust plagues in living memory. As highlighted in the media and the last edition of Groundcover, farmers will receive a 100 per cent rebate of the purchase price of registered chemicals used to treat locust hoppers on their properties during spring 2010. The Brumby Labor Government recognises that of the estimated area that could be affected by locusts, about one quarter is public land. With this in mind the Government has ordered \$4.2 million of locust-spraying chemicals for public land to help combat the plague. Agriculture Minister Joe Helper said the Department of Primary Industries (DPI) would need enough chemicals to treat an estimated 600,000 hectares of public land such as state parks. Mr Helper said three different chemicals had been ordered by the Government for spraying on public land, including: metarhizium, fenitrothion, and fipronil. DPI will monitor the environmental impact of spraying on private and public land as part of compliance assessments.



The locust lifecycle: Pictured above is a simple diagram of the locust lifecycle. There are three main stages of development — egg, nymph and adult. The nymph or hopper stage can be further divided into growth stages called instars. This diagram shows the lifecycle of the Australian plague locust which has five instars during the hopper stage. The times given for development are under optimum conditions during summer and are only approximate.

Locust Information Sessions for Small Landholders

In the coming weeks the Department of Primary Industries (DPI) will be running various information sessions in areas of the state that are likely to be affected by locusts as part of the Victorian Government's response to the serious locust threat facing the state in the coming months.

The DPI Small Landholder Information Service (SLIS) is playing a key role in community engagement and will be providing information and guidance specifically to meet the needs of small landholders.

The SLIS is currently planning to run a series of evening information sessions in the major rural towns which will inform small landholders on how best to treat locusts on their properties and what Government assistance is available to them.

Further to these events, any community group such as Landcare that is interested in learning more about locusts, and who would like someone from DPI to address their group, is encouraged to notify the Regional Landcare Coordinator or contact DPI direct to make the arrangements.

Grey-crowned Babbler

Our understanding about the conservation and ecological requirements of the Grey-Crowned Babbler is continually being improved following the latest survey results of population groups in the lower Loddon region.

Now considered to be one of the largest populations found along the lower Loddon River floodplain from south of Boort to the Murray River, the Boort-Loddon population consists of at least 100 groups and more than 500 birds. Surveys this year occurred in two 7,000 ha districts within this population area (preliminary results are shown below). In both districts, more birds and groups were found than previously, possibly because of greater survey effort this year. Average group size also continues to be high here, leading to better chances of groups raising young.

Grey-crowned Babbler - New PhD project

In further news a new study on Grey-crowned Babblers is being undertaken by Deakin University PhD candidate, Kate Stevens, to uncover the impacts of habitat fragmentation on population and family group dynamics. Kate is working at a large regional scale, and plans to gather data across the species southern-most distribution in Victoria, ranging from Boort and Kerang in the west, to Violet Town, Lurg and Rutherglen in the east. It's time to get crowdsourcing!

Do you want to share your local flora and fauna sightings and data with other like minded people? Individuals and community groups are encouraged to use a new community web mapping tool, which provides an opportunity to record spatial information on flora and fauna that has been spotted in your area. But what does crowdsourcing mean? Crowdsourcing is a term which describes the process of having a community of people, particularly amateurs or volunteers contribute to the collection of information, via a website. Spatial Vision has developed the Community Web Mapping Portal (CWMP), based on Google Maps, to support the crowdsourcing of map-based information, especially in the area of natural resource management. The CWMP allows the entry and display of point sites which record the location and details of flora and fauna sightings, pest infestations, remnant vegetation, revegetation and other significant sites. Community Grants - guides and directories

This handy resource outlines Federal, State and Local Government grants, along with philanthropic and corporate grants programs that are available for community and environmental groups. Box-Gum Grassy Woodlands Remnant protection

The North Central CMA will soon be offering grants to landholders in the mid Loddon region to protect remnants of the nationally endangered Yellow Box, or White Box Grassy Woodland communities (known as Box-Gum grassy Woodlands). Remnants can include derived grasslands, which are areas that have been cleared of these trees but still retain native understorey species such as herbs and grasses. Funds are available to eligible landholders through the Federal Government's CfoC natural resource initiative to implement onground works such as fencing and revegetation. The Mullum Trust

The Mullum Trust provides grants to support projects which have significant and ongoing environmental outcomes. Projects with specific localised environmental outcomes are preferred although projects which are locally based but have far reaching impacts are also encouraged. Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) - Small Grants for Rural Communities

The Small Grants for Rural Communities program benefits people in rural and remote communities. Not-for-profit organisations can apply for projects and activities that offer clear public benefit for communities living in small rural and remote locations in Australia, contributing to development in social and community welfare, economic, environmental, health, education or cultural areas. FarmReady Reimbursement Grants

FarmReady Reimbursement Grants of up to \$1,500 per year are available to assist primary producers and Indigenous land managers to attend approved training courses that are aimed at improving their capacity to adapt to climate change, and increase self-reliance and preparedness. To be eligible for reimbursement the courses need to have been completed prior to 30 May 2012. Application forms need to be lodged and approved prior to attending courses, followed by submitting the claim for reimbursement (up to 30 days after the completion of the course).
