A message from the Regional Landcare Coordinator

Hi everyone,

As I mentioned in the last newsletter it is almost Landcare Grants time again! The Victorian Landcare Grants will open in early May and each group will receive a grants package in the post. I will also be able to send electronic versions to those who request them. I will be putting the information on the Landcare page of the North Central Catchment Management Authority (CMA) website and the North Central page on the Victorian Landcare Gateway. There are a few changes to the program this year but they should actually make the process easier - hopefully you'll all agree! There will be two types of grants this year: projects grants (up to \$20,000) and maintenance and start up grants (up to \$1,000). All of the groups that are currently completing their 2010-11 Second Generation Landcare Grants are encouraged to apply again. So get your thinking caps on guys, we had some pretty great applications last year and I am sure we will get some exceptional ones this year!

We will again be running community information sessions for the Victorian Landcare Grants program and I will provide the dates and locations when they have been confirmed. At some of the information sessions I would like to run a grants writing session that will not only help you in applying for the Victorian Landcare Grants, but also other funding sources such as the Caring for our Country program, philanthropic groups, trusts and local council grant programs.

I have been fortunate enough to get out of the office over the last month attending workshops, forums and community meetings. I attended the very timely weed management workshop in Kyneton hosted by Ashley Beven, Regional Landcare Facilitator, North Central CMA. There was a great turn out from the local community to hear several quest speakers talk about integrated weed management, herbicide resistance, weed classifications and biological control. I also got the opportunity to hear two fantastic guest speakers at the 2nd Annual North Central Regional Soils Forum held in Bendigo. Julian Cribb, well known author, was the lead speaker and discussed the 'coming famine', the global food crisis and what we can do to avoid it. DPI's Productive Soils Specialist, Declan McDonald, spoke on the topic of soil management and how we need to better understand the ecological processes so that we can manage our soils to ensure efficient production.



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It is time to recognise the outstanding achievements of Landcarers in our community. Nominations for the Victorian and National Landcare Awards are now open. This is your chance to honour the people who make a positive difference to your local environment. For more information, read the 'Landcare Awards' article in this edition of Groundcover. There are a lot of people in this region that are worthy of nomination!

Before I sign off I want to let you all know that 2011 is the 25th anniversary of Landcare in Victoria. What an achievement! Landcare began in the North Central Catchment in 1986, when a group of farmers near St Arnaud formed the first Landcare group at Winjallok. The North Central Landcare team at the CMA is hoping to hold an event that will celebrate this significant milestone later in the year. Update from the Regional Landcare Facilitator (RLF)

It has been a busy start to the year with workshops around the catchment, a trip to Canberra and lots of plans for the coming months.

To kick off the year, a free public forum 'What's up with the weather? – Where to now for agriculture' was held in St Arnaud, in partnership with the Victorian Farmers Federation. Attendees learnt about the weather patterns influencing agriculture in Victoria and strategies to manage climate variability on farm. Guest speakers included Professor Tim Reeves, Senior DPI Climate Scientists and Wimmera farmer Susan Findlay Tickner. Professor Reeves highlighted the need for agriculture to adapt to climate change at the paddock, farm, business and catchment level. There will be a similar forum in Swan Hill during May 2011, so watch out for more details.

At the start of March I travelled to Canberra to meet with the other RLFs from around the country and learn about the Australian Government's proposed Carbon Farming Initiative (CFI). Over two days we heard from the policy makers, scientists and industry experts involved in the creation of the CFI. The initiative provides a means by which landholders can be rewarded, through carbon credits, for changes they make to their current land management practices that result

in carbon sequestration. Activities may include fertiliser management, reduced livestock emissions, soil carbon and reforestation. The legislation for the CFI has just been introduced to Parliament and the Australian Government is aiming to pass the legislation before 1 July 2011. For further information on the CFI visit the Department of Climate Change and Energy Efficiency website (www.climatechange.gov.au/cfi).

Two weed management workshops were also held during March at Kyneton and Toolleen. Topics covered included herbicide resistance, weed identification and the Victorian State Government's classification and prioritisation of weed species. The Kyneton workshop also included a presentation by Greg Lefoe, DPI, on the use of biocontrols to reduce weed infestations. Presentation notes will soon be loaded onto the North Central page of the Victorian Landcare Gateway under the 'Resources' tab. We are hoping to run more workshops in the near future, so if you are interested in attending a weed management workshop contact either myself or Jodie.

Supporting farmers to explore sustainable agriculture options

To help support landholders within our region, the North Central CMA is proposing a number of workshops and farm extension activities. The activities are a part of the CMA's 'Adopting Sustainable Farming Practices' project to support farmers within the irrigation areas of the North Central Victorian region. The project will explore options for sustainable agriculture for farmers who are considering permanent sale of their water share by providing access to new information, trial results and demonstrations of a range of sustainable farming practices suited to local conditions.

A landholder mentoring group will be formed to increase the localised and practical perspectives of the project. This group will consist of local farmers transitioning from intensive irrigation to other viable farming practices using innovative and productive alternatives.

The workshops and farm walks will be held over an 18 month period (from May 2011) and focus on a variety of topics suitable to the North Central irrigation region of Victoria. The project has been funded through the Australian Government's Caring for Our Country initiative.

Information packages and workshop planning are well under way, with a number of farm walks and workshops to be held in the near future. Rare sun shines in Horsham

It's the flora equivalent of a panda birth in captivity – the Horsham laboratory "hatching" of a rare orchid found in only two places in the world. The Brilliant Sun-orchid is the golden child of the specialist orchid growing facility at Horsham. It is one of several rare species being propagated by Environment Biodiversity Officer Dr Noushka Reiter. Noushka says the aim is to re-introduce them into secure sites in their natural range. Noushka and volunteer Wendy Bedggood, with support from several CMAs, are behind the growth of the tiny, beautiful Brilliant Sun-orchid, only two years after the propagation of threatened orchids began in Horsham.

Noushka said there are fewer than 30 Brilliant Sun-orchids in the wild and the plant's future was considered bleak. "This breakthrough is an important first and essential step in the long term recovery of the Brilliant Sun-orchid," Noushka said. The federally-endangered species only occurs in the Wimmera and North Central catchments, favouring remnant Box-Ironbark forests.

Specialised propagation techniques are being used for the Brilliant Sun-orchid and 14 other rare orchid species. Techniques are being developed for another 10, including the Metallic Sun-orchid, Spiral Sun-orchid, Desert Greenhood. Candy Spider-orchid, Melblom's Spider-orchid and Elegant Spider-orchid. "We aim to re-introduce these species into secure sites in their natural range and to continue the essential survey, monitoring and protection works," Noushka said. "We hope that – in the not too distant future - these rare blooms will be enjoyed by all."

Connecting Country's monitoring workshop

Sixty people attended the Connecting Country's Nest Box Monitoring Workshop in Campbell's Creek on 8 March. The evening was a great success with lots of audience participation and the organisers were delighted that the special children's activities complemented the evening's program.

The first speaker was Peter Johnson, Senior Biodiversity Officer, DSE, who has been monitoring Brush-tailed Phascogales (or Tuan) around Bendigo, Ballarat and Kinglake Ranges for ten years. Peter gave a comprehensive account of Brush-tailed Phascogales covering identification, habitat, behaviour and the importance of tree hollows for nesting. He pointed out that females require a minimum of 100ha each to survive and that 25 females constitutes a viable population. Thus a minimum of 2500ha is necessary to support a Brush-tailed Phascogale population. He also discussed current threats to Brush-tailed Phascogale populations posed by land fragmentation, conversion to small holdings, firewood collection and loss of large of trees.

Miles Geldard, a local landholder who has made 400 nest boxes for Connecting Country, outlined the extensive research that has backed up his approach to nest box construction and detailed the design and materials used for the next boxes.

Bryan McMullan, Connecting Country Project Officer, then described how landholders can be involved in monitoring the use of nest boxes by Brush-tailed Phascogales and other species. He explained that the optimum time for monitoring Brush-tailed Phascogales is March and April and that the process takes about 45 minutes. Monitors need to be set up with torches ten minutes before dusk and continue monitoring for at least half an hour after sunset.

What happens to the land following bushfire?

A series of short videos has been released by the Port Phillip and Westernport Catchment Management Authority (PPWCMA) with funding from the Australian Government's Caring for our Country program, about the most common land management issues faced by the community after the Black Saturday bushfires.

These videos are available to stream from the PPWCMA website (www.ppwcma.vic.gov.au/our-community/bushfire-resources/bushfire-recovery-on-private-land-documentary-series.aspx)

The series includes interviews with land management experts and locals about the steps they have taken to help their properties and environment recover. The six short documentaries cover native vegetation, weeds, native fauna, erosion, farm productivity and community recovery.

These stories provide valuable insight into what happens to land and the environment following a bushfire; what landowners should look out for and what issues to address first. Although the documentaries focus on the recovery from the Black Saturday fires, they are a valuable guide for all landholders whether they have experienced a bushfire or not.

Caring for our Country 2011-12 Grants NOW OPEN

Proposals for Landcare and environment projects are now invited under the Caring for our Country 2011-12 business plan. Up to \$178 million is available from the Federal Government to invest in projects that can be completed by June 2013. \$66 million has been set aside for base-level funding for regional NRM organisations, with the remainder falling under the open-call investment process. This provides an opportunity for diverse groups and organisations to obtain funding. Open-call projects should contribute to achieving outcomes in line with the six national priority areas for Caring for our Country and these priorities are:

- 1. increasing the National Reserve system;
- 2. biodiversity and national icons;
- 3. coastal environments and critical aquatic habitats;
- 4. sustainable farm practices;
- 5. remote and northern Australia; and
- 6. community skills, knowledge and engagement.

Applications for open-call applications close 30 May 2011. Details on the application process and eligibility guidelines are on the Caring for our Country website www.nrm.gov.au.

The 2011-12 Community Action Grants round is expected to open for applications around May 2011. Applications will be invited from environmental, Indigenous, Landcare, Coastcare and sustainable agriculture community groups for grants of between \$5,000 and \$20,000 (GST exclusive) for a broad range of activities that will contribute to Caring for our Country national priorities. Guidelines and eligibility criteria will be available when the 2011-12 Community Action Grants round opens. Keep an eye out for details in future editions of Groundcover.
