The importance of mucking about; keeping the social side of Landcare thriving in Muckleford

The Muckleford Catchment Landcare Group made a planning decision at one of our AGMs to focus on engagement of members in the upcoming year of activities, rather than large on-ground works projects. So that's what we did for much of 2017, with no grant money needed.

After surveying members, we found out what people wanted to hear about and put together a program of events.

We ran two morning workshops - Dams to Wetlands, and Landscape Restoration. Both workshops were at members' properties, with one of our members providing the information. We like to think of it as peer learning.

We had a planting day with the local Steiner school who are members of our group, and as part of a Connecting Country project, as well as two mornings taking off plant guards at a previous project planting.

We did a bike ride to Maldon, had lunch in a pub, and returned to Muckleford, all agreeing to make it an annual event for our group. We had a stall at our local community festival, Mucklefest, to hand out information and sign up new members, and lastly we hold Christmas drinks and planning for the following year.



Along with a roadside weed grant from the local council, and a project funded by the North Central CMA to restore Bassett Creek, we had a well-

rounded year of activities.

What we learnt this year is that it's important to communicate regularly with members, and run a wide range of events for people to attend. These events don't have to be massive, but they need to be friendly, inviting and informative. We communicate via our blog site, which is easy to keep up-to-date using Wordpress.



Even when there are no big projects happening, it's important to keep doing things, keep your group active via partnering in activities with your network, or running your own educational and social events.

Outstanding Victorian Aboriginal Leaders Honoured

Nine Aboriginal Victorians were inducted into the 2017 Victorian Aboriginal Honour Roll at a celebration held in Melbourne on November 21.

Now in its seventh year, the Honour Roll recognises the achievements of Aboriginal people, past and present.

Each inductee has dedicated their life to helping others and giving back to their community, while fighting for self-determination and equality.

Uncle Brien Nelson, a Jarra elder of Dja Dja Wurrung Country is familiar to many central Victorians, and was recognised for his generosity in sharing knowledge of culture and Country.

Brien's honour roll story reads "Brien's willingness to share knowledge of Aboriginal arts, culture and history, coupled with his warm and genuine nature, have not only made him a much-loved figure, but have helped to shape a more inclusive and united community in the central goldfields region."



Uncle Brien was a member of the CMA's Natural Resource Management Committee actively promoting partnerships between the North Central CMA and the Aboriginal community.

The wonders of Wirra-lo

A 2016-17 National Landcare Program funded Community Grant assisted in the planting of a diversity of wetland plant species at Ken and Jill Hoopers' covenanted property Wirra-lo Wetlands at Murrabit West. Ken and Jill have been working on restoring the wetlands at this property for a number of years in partnership with North Central CMA, Victorian Environmental Water Holder, Trust for Nature, GMW and Damien Cook.

Since the planting, which was carried out by local

Barapa Barapa community members Uncle Duck Charles and Robbie Kirby and wetland ecologist Damien Cook, there have been two deliveries of environmental water to the property and the wetland plants are thriving and rapidly spreading across the newly restored Brolga Swamp. As its name suggests this wetland has been specifically designed as a potential breeding site for brolgas.

The swamp provides valuable fauna habitat for growling grass frog, which were recently recorded on the floodplain, the first record since 2008. A number of locally and nationally endangered plant species are also now well established at the site, thanks to the work undertaken though community grants funds.



Ken and Jill have done a great job battling the weeds and the whole place is on a trajectory to becoming a model of what can be achieved by cooperative land caring.

Did you hear the one about the fox and the emu?

The current Gunbower Forest intensive fox baiting program has almost finished for 2017 and results are looking very positive for turtle populations.

Project Manager Amy Russell says that "Initial results have been extremely positive with turtle nests located within the fox baiting zone raided 50% less than those nests located in the non-baited zone (referred to as control sites). To help us monitor this program we use a number of monitoring cameras to see what's happening in the forest."

The images captured with remote sensor camera placed out in the forest and along bait station sites show the recent action caught on camera, including one inquisitive emu!









Turtles Australia Inc. recorded over 250 turtle nests during their November 'turtle month' monitoring in Gunbower Forest and surrounds with the help of local community, landholders, Bendigo Tafe and CMA staff.

Finally, we had to giggle when despite all her efforts to help this shelled soul from harm's way; Amy was swiftly soaked by this non-appreciative turtle during a weekend roadside rescue mission.



Biodiversity Response Planning (BRP)

Over the past month, representatives from Landcare, environmental community groups, government agencies and CMA's have been a part of a co-design process for responding to the Victorian Biodiversity Plan 2037.


The outcome of the co-design workshops was to create an agreed Biodiversity Response Planning process which will be up and running early in 2018.

Consultants will soon have a report available on the outcomes and recommendations from the collective responses. The report will encapsulate the discussion and an approach for moving biodiversity response planning forward.

Funding in the order of \$82M is available over four years to implement targeted, collaborative projects that align with Biodiversity 2037 targets.

World Soil Health Day

Upper Campaspe Landcare Network is hosting an event for World Soil Health Day on 5 December.

If you would like to learn more about Soil Health on your property and how to improve it why not come along on Tuesday 5 December on World Soil Day to a free workshop being run by the Upper Campaspe Landcare Network at an olive plantation in Edgecombe.

Experts such as Martin Hamilton, Rebecca Mitchell and Dr Helen Hayden from Agriculture Victoria will be presenting. Dr Hayden has over 20 years experience working in soil biology and plant pathology in many different agricultural industries and in native ecosystems. Dr Hayden said "Many landowners are generally aware of the soil chemical and physical constraints that can affect their paddocks and limit crop yields, but soils also have a biological component that plays an important role in soil health. In the workshop we will uncover why biology is so important for healthy soil, caring for the environment and getting the best out of our farming land."

Participants will learn how to evaluate the condition of their soil and apply appropriate management practices to ensure soil health. They will also gain knowledge on identifying possible soil health issues using nine simple visual tests conducted in the field.

By bringing in soil samples from their property attendees will learn how to use the Soil Health Score card to provide real- time information on the physical, chemical and biological characteristics of their soil. The latest Soil Health Guide produced by North Central CMA will be provided to participants, as well as lunch.

The guidance note is a starting point for Landcare groups and networks to engage with the Child Safe Standards. It is not designed to cover all child safety issues, but it can be adopted by groups and activity leaders and groups who have only occasional contact with children under 18.

One App wonder~ NatureBlitz

North Central Catchment Management Authority has developed this wonderful App that citizen scientists are using to help capture important spatial coverage of fauna species from across north central Victoria.

There are over 768 individuals from 187 reports already captured through NatureBlitz. This includes: 17 fish, 62 frogs, 8 platypus and water rats and 599 waterbirds

Exciting news - we have revamped the App!
NatureBlitz now includes more species. We have now added kangaroos, koalas, possums, snakes, lizards and terrestrial birds to the list. This App has everything you will need to start reporting animals. The observations captured through NatureBlitz are shared with the Victorian Government's Victorian Biodiversity Atlas and the Atlas of Living Australia and is highly valued by North Central CMA.

Your data is contributing to the national database of fauna. Download the App now for free and start reporting fauna in your area.

CLOSING SOON...National Landcare Program - Smart Farms Small Grants

The Australian Government is inviting applications via an open process for entities to deliver services under the National Landcare Program Smart Farms Small Grants.

Grants are available to support local on-ground projects across Australia that increase the knowledge and capacity of farmers and fishers. Project that facilitate the adoption of tools, technologies and improved land management practices to effectively, sustainably and productively manage Australia's natural resources and adapt to significant changes in climate, weather and markets are eligible.

Applications are invited for grants, the value of which range from a minimum of \$5,000 to a maximum of \$100,000 (GST exclusive).

Projects will be considered under two tiers:

- Tier 1 for those between \$5,000 and \$50,000; and
- Tier 2 for those between \$50,001 and \$100,000.

Under this grant round the Australian Government is seeking applications for projects that will be completed by 30 April 2020.
