Weed of the month...

Weeds Identification Guide - North Central Victoria.

RAGWORT Senecio jacobaea

(St James Wort, Tansy Ragwort)

Description: Short-lived, can flower twice a year producing 250,000 seeds from a large plant.

Flowers: Bright yellow in colour. In large clusters at the end of the branches. Each flower head is 2.5 cm in diameter with 12-15 petals surround it.

Leaves: Can range from dark green with few hairs to pale green with a downy appearance. Rosette leaves can grow up to 35 cm long stem leaves shorter and more wrinkled.

Stems: Can either grow single or several stems from the crown, branched at the top of the stem. Purple or reddish at the base near the crown.

Note: Causes death in stock through liver damage, seed can remain viable for 8-16 years.

Creating a Blueprint for Action



For the Loddon Plains Landcare Network (LPLN), it has been two years of work putting together a strategic vision that has resulted in our recently published "Blueprint for Action". Through words, maps and photos the Blueprint for Action outlines the network area, our focus, biodiversity elements and potential future landscape restoration projects, as part of the networks GOANNA Project - "Group Organised Action Nurturing Natural Assets".

The Blueprint for Action will be shown as a 'business model' to potential public and private sector investors to demonstrate that the LPLN thinks strategically about landscape restoration and improving environmental outcomes.

As the Landcare Facilitator for the LPLN, I have had the privilege to assist a passionate Landcare community to complete their vision document over the past 12 months, thanks to the Victorian Local Landcare Facilitator Initiative.

The process was varied, with my role ranging from running workshops to gather project ideas, to mapping, proofreading and to-ing and fro-ing with the graphic designer to get a booklet design that fits the network. Such is the diversity of experience that presents itself as a Landcare Facilitator.



To coincide with the completion of the Blueprint for Action, I facilitated the development of a brand new website for the network. The website enables a greater online presence, providing a medium to easily access the Blueprint for Action our bimonthly newsletter - and managing the LPLN blog.

Now we have turned our focus to the process of developing larger scale project proposals, including revegetation corridors, to implement across our region from projects listed in the Blueprint for Action.

We have a central reference for the network in hand and a vision we can be most proud of. Now our task is making sure this is truly a Blueprint for *Action*.

The progress of the network would not have been possible without the ongoing support of the Norman Wettenhall Foundation, the Victorian Government through the VLLFI and the North Central Catchment Management Authority.

Snaps of the month!

This month we have a couple of photos taken by Dion Lervasi who was undertaking the annual environmental flows fish monitoring survey on the Loddon River. Dion, an aquatic ecologist, routinely surveys a particular site and has done so over the last five years. They catch the fish by using boat electrofishing. Immediately after the floods Dion and his team were unable to access the site with the boat due to fallen trees. Two years after the flood they have been able to get back and survey.

Post flood they have collected some of the highest densities of Murray Cod that Dion has seen. Prior to the floods they collected 1-2 Cod per year, after the floods they have captured 6-7 Cod. These results suggest that the floods have facilitated fish movement - great for the fish and the health of the Loddon River.

River Detectives need your help!

Water for the Environment

Water for the environment is more commonly known as an environmental flow (Eflow). Eflows are any managed change in water flow pattern intended to maintain or improve the health of a river or wetland and with the aim of achieving key ecological objectives including fish movement and breeding, improvement in water quality and riparian vegetation health and enhancing bird breeding, feeding and roosting opportunities.

In the North Central CMA region there are a number of sites that receive Eflow's. They are:

- Campaspe River downstream of Lake Eppalock
- Coliban River downstream of Malmsbury Reservoir
- Loddon River downstream of Cairn Curran Reservoir
- Boort District Wetlands (Lakes Boort, Leaghur, Yando, Meran and Little Meran)
- Bullarook (Birch's) Creek downstream of Newlyn Reservoir
- Central Murray Wetlands
- Wimmera Mallee off-stream wetlands
- Gunbower Forest

What is a summer or low flow

Usually delivered in February, summer or low flows generally provide a continuous flow through the channel. This may either maintain the flow above a 'cease-to-flow' event or provide habitat as a change from 'high flows'. The benefits include connecting in-stream habitats and can have benefits for other system users, such as providing water for livestock (VEWH 2013).

Summer low flow freshes have been delivered to the Loddon River, downstream of Loddon weir and the Campaspe River, below the Campaspe siphon, north of Rochester.

Round Lake also received a 'top up' to maintain salinity and water levels for the Murray Hardyhead. 'Murray Hardyhead is a small native fish species listed as Endangered under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 and listed under the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988'.

Caring for our Country Community Landcare Grants are open

The Caring for our Country Community Landcare Grants are now open for applications for \$5,000-\$50,000. These grants build on the previous Community Action Grants, with a focus on sustainable farming and fisheries, agricultural innovation and community capacity building.

Grants between \$5000 and \$50 000 (GST exclusive) are available to help local community-based organisations and groups take on-ground action as well as build their capacity and skills, while contributing towards program outcomes to:

- increase the percentage and area of farming entities that have adopted sustainable land management practices to increase productivity and improve the quality of ecosystem services delivered to the broader community from their land, whilst building their resilience to climate change
- increase the percentage of fishing and aquaculture entities that have adopted sustainable and low environmental impact management practices to increase productivity
- increase the number and area of farming and fishing entities that have trialled innovative practices for improved natural resources management
- increase the percentage of farming and fishing entities and land managers improving their knowledge and skills in managing our natural resources to deliver ecosystem services.
- increase the capacity and confidence of regional community leaders, including women, young people, Indigenous Australians and culturally diverse communities involved in agriculture or fisheries production and the protection of natural resources, and
- increase engagement and participation by regional communities, including Landcare, professional farming, industry and other community groups or individuals, in activities to manage natural resources.
