

A message from the Regional Landcare Coordinator

Hi evervone.

The seasons are shifting, and as we move into Autumn, the winds are picking up, temperatures are moving into a bearable range but the long-awaited rain break may still be a while off as Victoria experiences above average March to May temperatures.

The Future Faming Expo on February 21, hosted Climatologist Dr Andrew Watkins (BOM), who discussed the seasonal climate outlook. Andrew's summary indicated that summer temperatures were well above average across Australia, soil moisture has been below average in western Victoria and the autumn rainfall predications are average-dry across most of Victoria. The weak La Niña period is in decline, which is having little impact in Australia, as we transition into a neutral winter period. I am always amazed at how practical and useful the BOM presentations are at the annual expo, and encourage you to visit http://www.bom.gov.au/climate/outlooks/#/over view/summary/ for further information, climate outlook videos and data from your local area.

March sees the first of our 2018 Landcare Network meetings, with the Network Facilitators meeting on 20 March and the Network Chairs on 22 March. Discussions will focus on the changes to the coming round of grants, updating the Landcare Support Plan (2018-2023) and updates from the local Landcare scene.

Have you got gorse?

RMCG and the Victorian Gorse Taskforce (VGT) are running a community survey to understand how people are managing gorse and what support they need from the VGT.

The VGT uses government investment to establish and support community-led projects, which aim to eradicate gorse where possible across Victoria.

The purpose of this project is to gain an understanding of the types of support that communities need from VGT to manage gorse in their local areas. RM Consulting Group have been engaged by VGT to run the survey, which seeks information about work done on your property to control gorse

The results from this survey will help identify opportunities to provide better support to you or your networks.

Biochar now included in the Carbon Farming Initiative

The biochar industry in Australia & New Zealand recently announced that the inclusion of biochar was made in the finalised method determination measurement of soil carbon sequestration in agricultural systems under the Federal Government's Carbon Farming Initiative.

Don Coyne (First Public Officer of ANZBI) explained in a recent article that "excluding tyres, rubber and sewerage this means farmers can now be paid to carry out ecosystem services on our behalf by applying biochar to their soils and managing carbon viably."

This new method provides an opportunity for landholders and businesses to earn Australian Carbon Credit Units by an increase in soil organic carbon. The benefits associated with applying biochar could include higher crop yields, better pasture, reduced erosion and improved soil health. biochar is made by heating biomass in limited

oxygen by a process called pyrolysis.

Pyrolyis or carbonisation can create bioenergy, biochar, wood vinegar and bio oils, nothing is wasted from sustainable sources of underutilised biomass that would normally decompose or be burnt and return to atmosphere.

Have you been over the Green Bridge?



The concept of the green bridge is not new, however it did come up several times at the Expo in Donald, so I investigated further.

The prevalence of crop pests and virus carryover in cropping systems, which are commonly harbouring in the 'green bridge', is a hot topic of investigation by <u>GRDC</u>. A green bridge consists of crop volunteers usually from last year's crop, and sometimes from crops grown one or two years before, plus weeds emerging from seeds set over many years, or from new windborne weed seeds

The viruses investigated are exclusively transmitted through aphid vectors, which I am now aware, hone in on the 'green bridges' like fighter pilots, as they fly above them, setting down to feed and in turn cause significant crop losses and damage during the growing season.

The year's activities have already kicked off with our official launch on Wednesday February 10 in Bendigo. The night's entertainment was drawn from all over the four participating municipalities, and drew couples, families and everyone else along for a party in Rosalind Park. The highlight of the evening was a moving ceremony of song and dance by Traditional Owners, the Dja Dja Wurrung and the announcement of YAPENYA, a celebratory event that will be taking place on November 17, 2018.

We are delighted to be working closely with both Visit Victoria and the ABC Central Victoria. You may have heard the ABC's live outside broadcast from Rosalind Park on February 14 during the afternoon drive program from 3pm to 4pm hosted by Fiona Parker. Visit Victoria has committed to promote four tourist itineraries around region in March, June, August and November. We are currently working to develop the communications for these itineraries (known as "Meander") which will be focused on encouraging visits to stay in the region for 3+ nights and to move across the region sampling its cultural activities of all kinds: food, arts activities, natural wonders and more.

Our website, www.rcc2018.com is now densely populated with performances, exhibitions, markets, festivals and more - it's genuinely aweinspiring to be able to observe the wealth of activities taking place in this inaugural Victorian Regional Centre for Culture. Greater Bendigo is of course one of the huge drawcards in the RCC area. Upcoming events that are receiving the direct support of the RCC include Scots Day Out and the Bendigo Easter Festival.

In Mount Alexander Shire, 2018 got going with RCC-supported events Maldon Twilight Dinner and Newstead Live. The RCC is also directly supporting Harcourt's Applefest, the Taradale Mineral Springs Festival and Arts Open.

On March 3, one of the RCC's key community events will take place in Newstead. Entitled Water Hole, this event will feature a parade created by the local school children, a compliments caravan, performances by local and other artists and a performance of *In the Deep End* by Asking for Trouble who will perform in the Newstead and District Swimming Pool. The highlight is expected to be a community dance-off featuring the volunteer committees of Newstead.

One of the delights of working in **Central Goldfields** is the collaborative approach taken by the Dunolly Community. The Tiny Towns Trail organised from Dunolly will featured elements directly supported by the RCC including a recycled fashion parade, community art project on the theme of Red Dog that will be creating art for display in the windows along Broadway, an exhibition by artist Deborah Halpern and more. The RCC is promoting the Tiny Towns Trail with the National Trust Heritage Festival. The RCC is also presenting performances at the March Talbot Market and Dunolly Community Market on November 11.

The variety and distinctive communities of Hepburn Shire have inspired the RCC team to develop a series of performances for markets in including the Daylesford Sunday Market and Glenlyon Village Market. We are also working on developing opportunities with the Booktown on Sundays series that takes place throughout 2018 in Clunes and the various tentacles of Words in Winter that create literary activities in Creswick, Trentham and Clunes.

The Australian Tax Office (ATO) has produced a fact sheet on the tax incentives for primary producers for establishing shelterbelts entitled "Establishing shelterbelts on land used in primary production business: Can I claim a tax deduction? What you need to know" (Dec. 2016).

The fact sheet was developed in a partnership between the ATO and the Basalt to Bay Landcare Network, and provides primary producers with useful information on the taxation, productivity and biodiversity benefits that can result from the establishment of shelterbelts.

Farm Chemical Users Course

Are you a Landcare member?

Do you want to upskill and undertake chemical use for pest and weed management?

The North Central CMA Landcare team is offering two Farm Chemical Users Courses in Glenlyon and Kyneton for Landcare members through Bendigo Tafe training providers.

Over this three-day course, (two full days and a one hour competency test on Day 3) participants will receive training in the basic skills and knowledge to select, purchase, transport, store, record and use agricultural and veterinary chemicals responsibly. Completion of this course is required before participants can be issued with an Agricultural Chemical Users Permit (ACUP) from Agriculture Victoria (*participants will apply for and fund their own ACUP permit)

Attending and receiving accreditation for this course normally costs \$450.00, however the North Central CMA is offering this heavily subsidised course at only \$100.00 for 20 Landcare members in the North Central CMA region.

Two courses will run as follows:

BOOKED OUT Course 1: Glenlyon (near Daylesford): Tuesday 10, Wednesday 11 & Thursday 12 April

Course 2: Kyneton: Monday, 30th April, Tuesday 1st and Wednesday 2nd May

Payment is required upon completion of the online EOI application. <u>A maximum of 10 participants can be subsidised for each course</u>.

Cesar PestNotes

Dr Sioban de Little, Sustainable Agriculture senior consultant at Melbourne based Cesar, recently spoke on all things aphids at the Future Farming Expo.

A highlight of her presentation was the service the Cesar provide, free to growers, agronomists and farm advisers, PestFacts. Subscribing to PestFacts south-eastern is one of the easiest ways you can stay informed about invertebrate pest threats in your region. A map service also provides insight into crop pests that have been reported through to Cesar since 2006

Sioban stressed the importance of photographing your unknown crop pest well (e.g. photos of grubby hands and a tiny speck aren't ideal) and sending it through. This is vital information for understanding the pests within cropping systems and assisting growers to make informed decisions about spray selections, timing, and rotations to increase the beneficial insects within cropping systems and reduce resistance in pest populations.

2018 Future Farming Expo

A large crowd of almost 120 people turned out at Donald to attend the Future Farming Expo. This year the North Central Catchment Management Authority partnered with the Wimmera Catchment Management Authority to deliver this fantastic event. This is the sixth expo run by the North Central CMA, which are held in different locations around the north central region.

The Donald Recreation Reserve was the ideal location for this event being close the North Central and Wimmera CMA boundaries and right in the heart of the farming community. The Donald community was very supportive of this event with volunteers helping to set up the venue to make sure the day ran very smoothly.

On the day there were 12 presenters covering a variety of topics based around risk and opportunity. The first key note speaker, Phil Callaghan, set up the day taking on investment for long-term sustainability highlighting that

investment and growth in agriculture had done very well over the past 20 years.

Three local farmers Adam Campbell, Jason Pymer and Chad Frost were generous enough to give up their time and provide an insight in to their farming operations and the importance of family and community in rural regions. Each farmer had different farming enterprises from broad acre cropping, mixed farming and pigs. They all had challenges ranging from the traditional day to day management to sourcing of reliable labour. The common themes among the farmers were family and community, which are obviously an important part of farming and living in a rural area.

The concurrent sessions have been popular at previous events and it was no different at this one. There were three concurrent sessions, which gave participants a choice of six speakers to choose from. These sessions covered a variety of topics such as virtual fencing, which is still being developed but will provide great benefits for farmers once development is finalised. There was also the latest weather forecast from Andrew Watkins from the Bureau of Meteorology, which is always a popular topic with farmers.

This was followed by Dale Boyd (Agriculture Victoria) providing the latest soil moisture readings from around the region. There were also presentations on succession planning and business decision making, these topics were relevant to a lot of participants at the expo. "It was one of the best events I have been too excellent speakers and well organised" one farmer said.

There were many businesses who took the opportunity to set up a display at the expo. These proved popular with participants and gave many local agricultural providers an opportunity to engage with farmers throughout the day.

It was great to see the Donald community supporting this event, the day was a huge success with many people commenting on the how pleased they were with the speakers and topics on the day.

National Landcare Program - Environment Small Grants

The National Landcare Program will provide a total of up to \$5 million in grants in 2017-18 to community, environment, and other groups to undertake eligible natural resource management activities that improve the quality of the local environment.

The program will support projects that address the following National Landcare Program objective:

 to protect and conserve Australia's water, plants and animals and the ecosystems in which they live and interact, in partnership with local communities.

The intended outcomes of the program are an:

- increase in the protection, rehabilitation and restoration of environmental assets
- increase in the natural resource management community delivering biodiversity and natural resources practice.

Grants are available for between \$5,000 and \$50,000. The maximum grant period is 12 months.
